Report from the United Church Council

Buzz Coster (UCC Secretary)

At its meeting in November, the United Church Council discussed a range of issues which included:

- The location of the new Garden of Remembrance, details of which were published in the December 2018 issue of LINK.
- The budget for 2019 was discussed. A deficit of £10,000 is forecast although it was sincerely hoped that this might be avoided.
- Safeguarding training is planned for those who work with children and vulnerable adults at St Mary's. Reluctantly, the Council agreed that anyone who was unable to undertake this training by February 2019 would be asked to step down from their role until such time as they had undertaken the training.

Meetings of the United Church Council take place on the second Monday of alternate months. For details, please see the calendar on the church website or in LINK.

St Mary's in the Past

We have been delving into our church archives for some years now in a fairly random way, sometimes moving forward or backwards a number of years. In response to reader request, we choose an older and a more recent year, the choice limited by our incomplete sets. This year we jump forward 5 years from 1908 to 1913, 106 years ago. The Revd Charles Meredith Octavius Parkinson was still the Vicar. He seems to be in a more jovial mood than before. Was it the 'Christmas spirit' that caused him to begin "My Dear Friends and Parishioners" instead of launching straight into that month's homily, and even to end, "as ever, your affectionate friend and vicar"? We shall see!

He first summarised the 'weal and woe' of the previous year: the sinking of the Titanic, 'astonishing events in the Balkans', Welsh disestablishment and Home Rule in Ulster, the 'vast Coal strike' that put some one and a half million men out of work and cost them £11 million in wages. On a happier note the King and Queen were greeted with 'loyalty, affection and fervour by their myriad subjects' during their visit to India and 'the Duke of Connaught was welcomed in Canada with like fervour' and subsequently 'offered three super-Dreadnoughts worth £7 million for the service of the Empire and towards the maintenance of her undisputed sovereignty of the sea'. In addition the Mikado of Japan had died and a bloodless revolution had occurred in China. The Revd Parkinson called for prayers:

to bring to nought all schemes of earthly rulers which are not righteous in His sight, defend His Church from all He sees that would not be for her progress and welfare, to safeguard the lawful rights and liberties of minorities in Ireland, to raise up large numbers of men and women to go forth to China, Japan, Korea, India, Africa, from whence, and indeed all parts of the heathen world, hands of welcome are outstretched and imploring cries to bring them to the knowledge of Christ are heard.

Turning to parish matters, he reported that people were generally in good health and a dozen people who had contracted scarlet fever were recovering. There had been one death from a motor accident in Suffolk and he gave road safety advice.

The Revd Heygate was leaving to take charge of a parish in Suffolk and the Church of England Men's Society presented him with a silver cigarette case. He said that he would always treasure it and urged them to remember that the Society had both social and spiritual sides and not to forget the spiritual one. He would be replaced in February by Mr Pain. The Christmas school treat and Prize and Medal Distribution was for 279 children invited because of their good conduct and regularity. They enjoyed 'an excellent and abundant tea' at the Girls' School before transferring to the Ebury Hall for the prize-giving and entertainment. Fourteen of 'Lady Ebury's beautiful medals' were awarded to pupils who were 'never absent, never late' and of invariable good conduct. Silver medals were awarded to four pupils 'never absent, never late' for 5 years and bronze medals to ten pupils for a year's unbroken record. Gifts of garments having been distributed earlier in the day, the children were entertained by two dancers demonstrating Indian, sword, tambourine and Indian club dances and an Irish jig, followed by a story and finishing with a tableau of *Rule Britannia*.

There had been a talk on *The History of Church Bells*, illustrated with lantern slides. In January there was to be a play, *Iris of the Rainbow* in the Town Hall, with proceeds going to the Organ Completion Fund.

1994

Twenty-five years ago, was a very interesting time in our church's history. By this time the Revd Bruce Drive was Vicar, the Church Centre was complete and in use, the Methodists had moved in. Although we still had separate Sunday morning services we had a United Church Council, a joint magazine, renamed LINK and edited by Scott Talbott. Anglicans and Methodists worked together in other ways and the great 'Renewal' was well under way. As a public appeal had helped to pay for the Church Centre it was too soon to have another to pay for largely maintenance work on the church building. The onus of fundraising rested with the congregation, who raised the money needed through a variety of enjoyable events, large and small. It was a time of 'Spiritual Renewal' too. A 'Renewal newsletter' was incorporated into LINK each month.

Name labels were to be worn during January to help people to get to know one another better.

A second part of the book *Living Flame about the history of Methodism* from 1968 to 1994 was now available, either separately or together with part 1. During research the author discovered that there was a 150 year history of Methodism in Rickmansworth, with 'some direct relationship with John Wesley himself'. The Revd Bruce Driver was to run a Deanery Day of Watercolour and Prayer. It would be a quiet day with conversation only during lunch, and a Eucharist.

Bill Sylvester, then head of Sunday School, wrote simply about the Bible, as he would have explained it to the children. He had nearly reached his target of filling the front four rows with children during the Sunday morning service.

The Centre Club were holding a Bistro; everyone was invited to one of two sittings: at 12 noon for members of the 10.45am congregation and 12.45pm for those at the 12 noon service.

Centre Club members were also asked what for them would make a 'perfect church'. Among twenty-eight innovations suggested (at that time) were younger vicars, 'exciting' sermons, sermons on moral issues, women priests, intercessions in rap style, later services followed by Sunday lunch, and 15 minute services every hour. The list ended with a number of ways they wanted the church to help the community, like providing a soup kitchen open all day, and keeping the Church Shop open permanently. [The Church took over an empty shop in Penn Place and ran it to raise funds for the Renewal].

As numbers for Evensong were falling, there were to be 'Sunday Evening Specials' - Evensong two Sundays in the month, the ASB service and a Methodist preacher another, and 'something special' on the Third Sunday of the month.

The Renewal Section: Most of the building and maintenance work was complete. The church had been redecorated inside, the South clerestory windows made safe, new lighting installed, fire resistance and electrical work done and the stonework on the tower attended to. However, it still had to be paid for and fundraising continued. One event advertised was a cake decorating demonstration by Mabel Tindall. The crafts group was to become a permanent feature of St Mary's life, meeting on one afternoon and one evening each month. The shop had raised £7,000 and would reopen in the autumn. The programme up to November included a Starter Party at the Leveridges, a Valentine Junior Disco, a Jumble Sale, an Antiques Evening, a Coffee Morning, a Garden Event, a Musical Evening, Frank Topping's Show and the Vicar's Pilgrimage along the Pilgrim's Way from Southwark to Canterbury.

Man on the spot: Story of a News reporter

Rickmansworth During World War 1

1915

During the sorting of the archives in 2018 a bound copy of our 1915 magazines was discovered and immediately borrowed by members of the Historical Society for World War 1 research. One of the letters from it was read at the town's Remembrance Service. We may include news from this magazine from time to time especially about what was happening at home in Rickmansworth at that time. The January magazine suggested a fairly upbeat mood for meeting adversity and a strong belief in the cause, as in the Vicar's letter:

The New Year opens amid deep national anxiety, but not overanxiety because we trust and believe that our cause, being a righteous one, will prevail. ...we have abundant cause for thankfulness. Our sailors and soldiers are worthy of our pride in them; acquitting themselves with splendid gallantry and supreme fortitude under circumstances extremely trying and behaving in all ways as Christian gentlemen.

And we civilians at home are responding wonderfully - both men and women - to the call of duty. The war has already done us good, and we are learning many lessons.
